2. State of Michigan Licensing Requirements:

License Requirements

A cosmetologist is an individual who renders or offers to render cosmetology services.

Cosmetology services means 1 of the following services, or a combination of the following services:

- hair care services
- skin care services
- manicuring services
- electrology (cosmetologists must be separately licensed as an electrologist to render, or offer to render electrology services)

To become licensed as a cosmetologist an individual must be at least 17 years of age, be of good moral character, have an education equivalent to the completion of the ninth grade, have completed either not less than 1,500-hour course study in a licensed school of cosmetology, or have served as an apprentice for not less than 2 years in a licensed cosmetology establishment in which hair care services, skin care services and manicuring services are offered and have successfully passed an examination prescribed by the board and the department.

3. Rationale for programs that are longer than state requirements and benefits to be derived from the additional training:

Nail Technician: In Michigan, applicants for state licensure must have 400 clock hours of training and must pass a written and practical exam. The rationale for our 600 Nail Technician program is that it features additional emphasis on special effects, work with a nail drill and greater practical experience. The added benefits of this for students include greater familiarity with special effects along with enhanced nail drill proficiency, which will make them more competitive in today's work environment.

Advanced Esthetics: In Michigan, applicants for state licensure must have 400 clock hours of training and must pass a written and practical exam. rationale for our 600-hour program is that it avails students additional time to focus on artistic principles (makeup) and skin care techniques. The added benefits of this for students include greater familiarity with artistic principles of makeup and skin care techniques which will make them more competitive in today's work environment.

Instructor: The State of Michigan requires 500 hours of instruction for this program. The rationale for our 600-hour program is that it avails students additional time to focus on course development and practical teaching. The added benefits of this for students include more familiarity with course development and practical teaching, which will make them more competitive in today's work environment.

5. Physical requirements of the industry:

Barbers, hairstylists, and *cosmetologists* work mostly in a barbershop or salon. Physical stamina is important, because they are on their feet for most of their shift. Many work full time, but part-time positions are also common. 6. Ability to meet requirements set forth by employers:

Employers require workers to be licensed in their field, have creativity and keep up with the latest trends in their industry. Customer-service skills are a must. Employees must be pleasant, friendly and able to interact with a wide range of clients. They must be good listeners to understand what a client wants and ensure satisfaction with the result. Employees should always keep a professional personal appearance and keep their

work area clean and sanitary. This requirement is necessary for the health and safety of their clients and for making clients comfortable. Last but not least, employees must have solid time-management skills in scheduling and keeping appointments.

7. Distance Education Technologies required to successfully complete the course:

Students will need to have a reliable at-home Internet connection and a device (smartphone, tablet, laptop, computer) that can connect to the Internet.

8. Information on MCB - Monroe Facilities:

Michigan College of Beauty - Monroe occupies 8700 square feet of space. The school consists of six spacious self-contained classrooms and a large well-lighted and ventilated clinic area that is fully equipped with shampoo bowls, styling stations, hair dryers, a reception desk, a dispensary and waiting area for clinic patrons. There is a separate clinic for skin care services where clients may receive treatments in total privacy. The school also contains a manager's office, admission's office, financial assistance office, staff lounge, student lounge, president's office, stock rooms and two handicap accessible restrooms.

There is ample and free parking in the plaza lot. The school is handicap accessible.
